Comments on Colleen Murphy's The Conceptual Foundations of Transitional Justice

Addressing Past Wrongdoings: What *Kind* of Justice Should Be Done?

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Abstract: Colleen Murphy has recently proposed an innovative approach to the normative theorization of transitional justice understood as the "just pursuit of societal transformations". Central to Murphy's argument is the claim that this pursuit requires discharging a set of duties of justice of a distinctive kind, irreducible to those of retribution, correction, and distribution. While I concur with Murphy's claim concerning the irreducible relational nature of transitional justice, in this piece I show that this latter falls short of identifying a specific kind of justice. I suggest that what distinguishes the different demands of justice that Murphy singles out is the extent to which they commit to the specific realization of the two general kinds of duties of either end-state or interactive justice in different circumstances.
