Dr Margot E Salomon is Senior Lecturer at the Centre for the Study of Human Rights and Law Department, London School of Economics. She specialises in international human rights law and its application to world poverty, development, and issues of global economic justice. Dr Salomon was a consultant to the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights on extreme poverty and human rights (2009); Advisor to the UN High-level Task Force on the Right to Development (2004-9), and; a Member of the International Law Association's Committee on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (2008-2012). She currently sits on the Executive Board of the Association of Human Rights Institutes. In 2012 Dr Salomon was a Fernand Braudel Senior Fellow at the European University Institute, Florence.

Dr Salomon is Guest Editor of the November 2012 issue of the *Global Policy Journal* Special Section on International Law, Human Rights and the Global Economy; she is one of the authors of the legal "Commentary to the Maastricht Principles on Extraterritorial Obligations of States in the area of Economic, Social and Cultural Rights", *Human Rights Quarterly* (2012), and; lead author of the World Bank study on "Human Rights and Economics: Tensions, Synergies and Ways Forward" (2012).
